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Exposition of Human Aggression in the Plays of Thomas Edward Bond

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1.1 Introduction

Aggression and violence are the most vital issues of the modern society. Despite wide spread education, independence, freedom of thought and speech, freedom from deprivation, fulfillment of basic needs and wants, improvement in socio-economic conditions, style of living, improvement in child rearing practices, in many countries around the world, aggression and violence are on the rise. Mass media like newspapers, television, etc. gives full information on violence, crime, rape, child abuse, sexual harassment, molestation, etc. The alarming rise in the aggressive and indiscipline behaviour of modern men raise finger at the way the society is progressing.

1.2 Coexistence of aggression

The modern society is characterized as highly civilized, educated and belong to great nations of the world. It has high traditions, glorious culture and heritage. It feels proud for the contribution and sacrifice of the great parents and ancestors to the nation at the cost of their personal interests and comfort and happiness. 1.3 The concept of aggression, its meaning and characteristics

According to Mussen, Conger and Kagan (1969), "Aggressive behaviours are actions that are intended to cause injury and anxiety to others including hitting, kicking, and destroying property, quarrelling, derogating others, attacking others verbally and resisting requests."¹

Aggression is a hostile motivation. It is the wish or desire of an individual to cause injury or anxiety to others. Freud's view of aggression suggests that everyone is born with an aggressive drive and this innate motive expresses itself in action on fantasy, in sadism, destructiveness of war. Alder considered aggression as an instinct, but it is not the same as

the 'death instinct' of Freud. Aggression is self-protection and the affirmation of the self. It is always a consequence of frustration but it is not the only one. It is an instinct of combat. It is far from being injurious. It is obvious from various studies that learning, past experience, cognition, and various environmental factors are responsible for the aggressive behavior.

1.4 Meaning of aggression

There are four meanings attached to the term aggression. They are: 1. Self Assertiveness. 2. To gain possession either of a person, property or object.3. Hostility, attack or destruction either directly or indirectly. 4. The act of control or sense of dominance.

1.5 Definition of aggression

The World Book Dictionary defines aggression as, "1. The first step in attack or a quarrel; an unprovoked attack . . . 4. An act or attitude of hostility, usually arising from the feelings of inferiority or frustration."²

The Oxford English Dictionary: Volume I defines aggression as, "1. An unprovoked attack; an assault. 2. The act of beginning a quarrel or war. 3. Behaviour intended to injure another person or animal. B. self assertion, forcefulness."³

Aggression in any form of behavior of harming or injuring others and it includes all overt and covert acts. It is a negative character.

1.6 Types of human aggression

Aggressive behavior may manifest itself in different forms or types. Extra punitive, intro punitive, in punitive are different types of aggression.

1.7 Title of the study

Exposition of human aggression in the plays of Thomas Edward Bond is the title of the study.

The World Book Dictionary defines exposition as, ". . . 2. A detailed explanation. 3. A speech or writing explaining a process, thing or idea. . . 5. Exposure."⁴

The World Book Dictionary defines aggression as,"1. The first step in attack or quarrel; an unprovoked attack . . . 4. An act or attitude of hostility, usually arising from the feelings of inferiority or frustration."⁵

Human is defined as, ". . . 4. Having to do with people; belonging to mankind. Having or showing qualities belonging to man. Human describes or suggests any quality, good or bad,

belonging to man as aprt from animals or God, but particularly suggests his feelings or faults."⁶

Exposition of human aggression in the plays of Edward Bond might be taken to mean the speech or writing explaining human aggression, which is manifested in the plays of Edward Bond. In this context, it is an act of explaining in writing the manifestation of human aggression and violence in the plays of Edward Bond.

1.8 Objectives of the study

An attempt has been made in this investigation to study the exposition of human aggression in the plays of Edward Bond as well as to bring out the different types of human aggression as dealt in the plays of Edward Bond. The specific objectives of the present research are:

1.12 Significance of the study

The study of the human aggression is not a new one. Social psychologists in the past as well as in the present have shown vigorous interest in the laboratory and field experiments to identify the various

variables of aggression. Aggression is aggravated by previous histories of conflict or other groups that may be hostile to the interests of the threatened group. This view is of the psychologists.

This study should be considered as first of its kind for having brought out such topical interests. Lastly, this study tries to establish a link between literature and Psychology, taking human aggression in the plays of Edward Bond as a case study. Here again this study gets more importance.
